**REPORT FOR THE MEETING OF
THE ADVISORY WATER COMMISSION OF THE San Joaquin COUNTY
FLOOD CONTROL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT
January 20, 2021**

The regular meeting of the Advisory Water Commission of the San Joaquin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District was held on Wednesday, January 20, 2021, beginning at 1:00 p.m., via the Microsoft Teams Meeting Platform.

Mr. Tom McGurk, Chairman of the Advisory Water Commission (AWC), called the meeting to order at 1:03 pm.

I. Roll Call

Present were Commissioners, Torres-O’Callaghan, Swimley, de Graaf, Wright, Winn, Herrick, Holbrook, Elizabeth, Hartmann, Neudeck; Alternate Reyna-Hiestand; Secretary Zidar and Chairman McGurk. Also in attendance were Commissioners Nomellini and Price who arrived after roll call was completed.

Others present are listed on the Attendance Sheet. The Commission had a quorum.

II. Approval of Minutes for the October 21, 2020 Meeting

Commissioner Dante Nomellini made the motion and Commissioner John Herrick second to approve the minutes of October 21, 2020

Chairman McGurk asked for any Opposed or Abstained. With none opposed, the motion passed unanimously.

SCHEDULED ITEMS

Mr. Tom McGurk, Chairman of the Advisory Water Commission (AWC), led the agenda.

III. Discussion Items:

A. Project Updates

1. Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA)

Secretary Matt Zidar provided the Commission with the following updates of the SGMA related items below.

a. Eastern San Joaquin Subbasin

GWA future meeting dates were presented to the Commission, as well as timeframe for DWR’s notes on the submitted GSP.

b. Tracy Subbasin

The Commission was advised that the Tracy Subbasin GSP is moving along and on track for submission to DWR by the 1/22/21 due date. It was also noted that there are Public Workshops scheduled.

2. IRWMP Update

Secretary Zidar provided the Commission a status update on the IRWMP process, including the next meeting date and time. It was noted that the plan was being presented for approval at that afternoon's meeting. Secretary Zidar noted some of the projects included in the updated plan. Commissioner John Holbrook clarified that the next meeting was that afternoon, following the close of the Advisory Water Commission Meeting.

3. NPDES SWQCCP Workshops

Secretary Zidar provided the Commission brief details regarding the NPDES SWQCCP Workshops scheduled for January 27th, 29th and February 3rd, noting the workshops will provide the attendees with key updates to the SWQCCP.

4. Community Rating Systems Annual Report and Program Status

Secretary Zidar reported that the Community Rating System Annual Report had been submitted. In addition, Secretary Zidar advised that ways to improve the overall rating were being discussed.

B. SEWD / CSJWCD Consolidation and LAFCO Process

Mr. Scot Moody with SEWD presented information on the SEWD / CSJWCD Consolidation and LAFCO Process. Mr. Moody discussed the proposed consolidation, why it makes sense and where they are in the process, noting the consolidation came to fruition with the passing of SGMA and the need to meet target surface groundwater levels to reach sustainability. Mr. Moody added that the two Districts met and discussed the opportunity for partnership and improvement and entering the LAFCO process. Mr. Moody additionally spoke of the landowner support in the merger, as well as support from landowners in what may become a district annexed area. Mr. Moody advised that they are looking into how to get more surface water put to use, noting his personal goal is 40,000 acre feet at a minimum between the two Districts. Mr. Moody noted there is some opposition, which was provided as a part of the agenda package, and briefly reviewed those concerns with the Commission.

Secretary Zidar noted that he has asked Jim Glasier with LAFCO to come speak on the LAFCO process and what are the opportunities for public input.

Commissioner Mary Elizabeth asked with only 66,000 of the 155,000 combined acres being used, how much of that 66,000 is municipal and how much is agriculture. Mr. Moody advised that it was almost 50/50 between the two. Commissioner Elizabeth additionally questioned if the reason the total 155,000 allocation was not being used had to do with facilities. Mr. Moody advised that was correct, explaining that municipal is what it is and will increase as the city grows and the other aspect is landowners adjacent to the water ways that need to be encouraged to install pumps to draw surface water rather than pulling from the ground.

C. American River Water Rights SWRCB Status Hearing – February 17, 2021

Secretary Zidar discussed the upcoming American River Water Right Application and the upcoming status hearing. Secretary Zidar provided background and details of the application and the hearing, requesting further discussion. Secretary Zidar advised that County Counsel is currently involved and he also wanted the AWC apprised and involved. Secretary Zidar additionally noted that there is a potentially a similar situation with the Mokelumne River Rights Application.

Mr. Fritz Buchman of San Joaquin County added that they are working with Counsel to buy some time, to allow meeting with stakeholders, but the bottom line is that unless we are able to secure partners and start working in earnest, it's going to be cancelled. Mr. Buchman additionally spoke of the Mokelumne Water Rights, noting that although there hasn't been notice in that application, but unless we start making progress on that one we could be in the same situation down the road some point.

Commissioner Elizabeth asked if any of the required studies noted in the State Board document, included in the agenda, were completed. Secretary Zidar stated that a number of the activities noted were completed, related to groundwater modeling and things included in the GSP, but other items were not completed. Secretary Zidar noted that while we have been paying annually to maintain the water rights, there has not been a substantial focus on this.

Commissioner John Herrick added that this process has been going on for years and that he recommends that SJC Public Works, Attorneys and representatives from the major Districts discuss and decide if this Water Rights Application is part of their long term plans. Secretary Zidar advised that sit downs were held in the past, with work plans and cost developed, but there was no stakeholder response. Mr. Buchman added that they are trying to buy time to have one last sit down with potential stakeholders, noting that previous meetings resulted in an approved three year work plan at 14 million dollars and there was no interest from stakeholders at that time.

D. CV Salts, ILRP, SGMA Relationship and Integration

This agenda item moved up to accommodate the guest speaker and their calendar.

Mr. Tom Grovhoug with Larry Walker Associates presented information on the Central Valley Salinity Alternatives for Long-Term Sustainability (CV-SALTS) program and how it will be integrated and impact the area. Mr. Grovhoug provided details on the program's background history, status and schedule, and the basic program plan and goals. Mr. Grovhoug presented the Nitrate Control Program details, specifically notices provided, permitting pathway options and affected parties in San Joaquin County and their priority area.

Secretary Zidar questioned how this affects parties already on a management plan. Mr. Grovhoug explained that this program will bring all parties who contribute to the nitrate problem under the same guidelines and will add to the management that is already happening.

Mr. Grovhoug continued, providing details on the Salt Control Program, specifically notices issued, permitting pathway options and affected parties in San Joaquin County. Mr. Grovhoug provided details on the timeframe of the decisions needing to be made and what those decisions may be, noting that the Salinity Control Program requires a decision by July 5, 2021. Mr. Grovhoug explained that Nitrate Control Program requires proactive steps to make decision, with mandated action anticipated in the next 2-4 years for ESJ Subbasin. Mr. Grovhoug added that there is a Salinity Control Program Workshop scheduled for February 10th.

Commissioner George Hartmann provided input on the program, stating that he serves several dairy clients who are going to be impacted to the point that the business may not survive. Commissioner Hartmann questioned what is foreseen for struggling dairies to comply with the Priority 2 requirements. Mr. Grovhoug advised that dairies were an active participant in the whole program process and that there are websites for zones under development where potential fiscal impacts can be seen. Commissioner Hartmann additionally questioned the benefit or just studies. Mr. Grovhoug explained that the direct benefit is to provide water to impacted parties and the projects and management actions are longer term benefits. Commissioner Hartmann added that dairies are already in a nitrate program.

Commissioner John Herrick added that it has been a long term issue with having millions of tons of salt come from the Delta from further up the Valley, and that both the Regional and State Water Boards approved the CV- SALTS Program knowing that the salts come from south of the Delta and then impair Delta water quality. Commissioner Herrick added that this program is not a choice, but rather a method of making affected parties pay for a problem that is not really theirs. Commissioner John Holbrook added that he believes that farmers and dairymen should not be the only ones being charged and that the State should pay for the program and then charge evenly. Commissioner Holbrook added that a benefit for all people should be the responsibility of all people and not just a select group. Mr. Grovhoug advised that the State does have grant and loan programs to assist.

Alternate Commissioner Stephanie Reyna-Heistand advised the group that she forwarded the webinar information to the Clerk to be distributed to the members.

Mr. Dominick Gulli, member of the public, commented that this is a state mandate, noting that the Commission of Mandates can be contacted to protest state mandates made without the provision of funding needed to implement a program. Mr. Gulli suggested that someone attend the Commission of Mandates Meeting if the group feels the State should be paying for.

Mr. Grovhoug added that these program will need the funding of State and Federal in order to be effective and meet sustainability.

E. Homeless Impacts on Levees and Drainage

Secretary Zidar spoke regarding the homelessness issue, soliciting input from members of the Commission.

Commissioner Neudeck spoke, stating that as he represents several RDs in Stockton, noting that they have been challenged regularly with campers on the levees. Commissioner Neudeck spoke of the support he received from the City of Stockton, Stockton PD, PW, etc., while working on the Smith Canal to remove homeless camps and repair the levees, noting that police had to remove campers daily. Commissioner Neudeck discussed a bill carried by a representative in Sacramento that will be going back to the Assembly this year and will include expanded language that will provide greater authority to remove campers more expeditiously. Commissioner Neudeck noted he is happy with the City of Stockton's involvement.

Commissioner Dan Wright added to the discussion, advising that the City of Stockton sees continuous encampments on the sloughs and levees and does move the campers only to have them return. Commissioner Wright discussed the need for additional funding for not only housing, but the mental health and drug abuse issues, noting that there is a lot of work to be done, but not a lot of resources to accomplish.

Mr. Fritz Buchman added that San Joaquin County also has a Homeless Response Team, which includes Public Works, Public Health and other County Departments, and they have seen some success in removing the homeless from public areas.

Mr. Dominick Gulli, member of the public, provided accolades to several individuals for their efforts and added that while working with the RDs, they will use large boulders to keep campers out and that the Sheriff's Department has been a help with removal of campers. Mr. Gulli advised of a levee area under I-5 that is the responsibility of Cal Trans to handle and they have not repaired. Mr. Gulli requested that a public official attend their meeting and demand they fix the area.

F. 2021 AWC Objectives and Commission Review of the 2015 Strategic Plan to Meet Water Needs

Secretary Zidar introduced the agenda item and asked for discussion on the 2021 AWC Objectives and the 2015 Strategic Plan to Meet Water Needs. Secretary Zidar reviewed the main goals of the 2015 plan.

Chairman McGurk questioned if a plan was composed, would SJC Public Works have the staff to do the work. Secretary Zidar advised it would be a combination of SJC Public Works staff and stakeholder partnerships. Commissioner Dante Nomellini added that these goals were all still good goals and there was not a need to change the plan. Commissioner Nomellini noted that there needed to be concentration on a project to put water in the East San Joaquin County area. Secretary Zidar noted that there has been some discussion at the GWA as to what the County's role should be.

Commissioner Hartmann commented that the Commission should review what they think they are supposed to be doing, as he believes the AWC, with all its great contributors, could be doing more than it does. Commissioner Elizabeth added that during the GSP development, there was an interest from the stakeholders group in a project that could be supported by everyone in the County, creating unity.

Secretary Zidar advised that he would like to speak further with Commissioners to get some additional guidance for the plan moving forward. Commissioner Hartmann added that he would like to see a few clear objectives that have value to the County community that can have work and energy put into. Commissioner Chuck Winn added that in the GWA there have been discussions on developing funding programs and creating options on how to pay for projects.

G. Grants

Secretary Zidar provided a brief overview of the grants listed below, noting status as either pending or in process.

1. Prop 68 Implementation, NSJWCD North Systems Improvement
2. Watershed Coordinator Grant via GWA
3. CV / Delta: System Wide Flood Risk Reduction Program Guidelines
4. Statewide: System Wide Flood Risk Reduction Program Guidelines

H. Reports from Member Agencies

No reports provided.

IV. Action Items:

A. Selection of Officers

Secretary Zidar advised the Commission of the need to select officers for the 2021 year, in accordance with the Commission's by-laws. Chairman McGurk advised he was available and willing to continue acting as the Chairman.

Commissioner John Holbrook made the motion and Commissioner George Hartmann second to keep the same Chairman and Vice Chairman.

Chairman McGurk asked for any Opposed or Abstained. With none opposed, the motion passed unanimously.

V. Informational Items:

A. DWR Status Report to GWA

Secretary Zidar briefly explained the DWR Report, compiled by Chelsea Spier, included in the agenda package.

VI. Public Comment: Public comments, adopted by the Advisory Water Commission on January 17, 2018, will be limited to 3-minutes, unless extended to the discretion of the Chair.

Dominick Gulli, member of the public, addressed the Commission. Mr. Gulli advised the Commission that he submitted written comments relative to SJAFCA via email prior to the meeting, requesting that they be included in the meeting minutes. Mr. Gulli thanked Chairman McGurk for trying to hold SJAFCA responsible to answer his questions and hoped SJAFCA will answer the questions. Mr. Gulli added a thank you to the Commission and to staff for the DWR Report sheet.

VII. Commissioner's Comments:

Commissioner Jennifer Torres-O'Callaghan thanked the Commission for the discussion on the homeless issue. Commissioner Torres-O'Callaghan advised that she would like to hear from the County's Homeless Task Force at a future meeting and would also like to keep the item on the agenda every three to four months.

Chairman McGurk asked for Secretary Zidar to discuss with SJAFCA their response to Mr. Gulli's comments from the prior meeting.

Public Comments

Thank you publishing Dominick Gulli's public comments of 10/21/21 in the minutes, albeit inappropriately censored for whatever reason. The executive director of the San Joaquin Area Flood Control Agency stated in public that *"all of Dominick Gui/i's comments/information is incorrect"*. God, Bless you, Chairman, McGurk for holding to your oath of office to defend the constitutional rights of the PEOPLE of the County when you **strongly requested** that SJAFCA respond in writing and stating that *"now that it has been brought up it should not be just brushed away and disappear."* Is a very assuring sign that maybe Freedom of Speech does still exist in this County and Country.

SJAFCA provided no such response, because Dominick Gulli's statement made on behalf of the PEOPLE in this County are 100% true. As a Civil Engineer in the State of California, I am required to tell the truth the whole truth and nothing but.

Mr. Elias Stated:

He (Dominick Gu/li, PE, PLS) brings up all the time that the project itself is not needed we wanted to debunk that effectively as a whole host of body of work in that respect and then constantly this man has always said that the project couldn't get a permit couldn't get the land rights to build the project that in fact the US government wasn't going to grant the land to build the projectAnd

'there is no way we would be doing the project without having those in place so all he has to do is come to me and I would be happy to share all the information with him.

The public record is STILL VERY unclear as to whether or not SJAFCA has obtained the right of way for the Smith Canal Gate Project. **(Footnote 1 See RFI # 1 for Smith Canal Contract No 20-01)**

To reiterate the Mandate Issue with the 200-year level of protection:

California Constitution Article VIII B Section 6 (c) states that: A mandated new program or higher level of service includes a transfer by the Legislature from the State to cities, counties, cities and counties, or special districts of complete or partial financial responsibility for a required program for which the State previously had complete or partial financial responsibility.

The State mandated 200 year level of protection is FAR more stringent then required of the National Flood Insurance Program.

(SB 5(Government Code 65302.9 (d) and 65860.1 (b) States: "The Legislature finds and declares that flood protection in the Sacramento and San Joaquin Rivers drainage areas is a matter of statewide concern and not a municipal affair")

SB 5 states that: "if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs **shall** be made pursuant to these statutory provisions."

The County and the Cities in the County have failed to petition the Commission of State Mandates of whether the SB is a mandate. Instead the San Joaquin Area Flood Control Agency has **embraced** the regulations and mandate and is actively pursuing special assessments, funding mechanisms and now extensions of all kinds to try to achieve the impossible.

Request For Information No. 1 dated January 24, 2001 for the Smith Canal Construction project.

Per the public record the **Land and Right of Way** and the status for this project is as follow:

- ▶ (SGCC) The Stockton Golf and Country Club portions of the 7th and 8th golf holes.
(SGCC)

SJAFCA filed Eminent Domain Lawsuit on 8/30/19 in San Joaquin Court Superior Court Case No STK-CV-UED-2019-11392. The case currently has a hearing on 2/6/20 for a **Motion for immediate possession.**

- ▶ (DWSC) Dad's Point which is within the existing Right for Way for the Stockton Deep Water Ship Channel (DWSC).

Per (Ex 70) 4/17/19 USAGE 408 Permission letter, the property is being obtained through an out-grant process as defined in EC No 1165-2-220 POLICY AND PROCEDURAL GUIDANCE FOR PROCESSING REQUESTS TO ALTER US ARMY CORPS OF

ENGINEERS CIVIL WORKS PROJECTS PURSUANT TO 33 USC 408. No formal action has been taken by the board of the agency relative to acquiring the land from the federal government.

- ▶ (TB) The portion of Atherton Cove that was condemned in July 21, 1949 by the United States of America, for a Ship Turning Basin, per Judgement No. 6199, filed in book 1221 page 7 San Joaquin County Records. (EX 80)

It is not clear from the record if this land is also being obtained through the out-grant process. However, no formal action has been taken by the board of the agency relative to acquiring the land from the federal government.

- ▶ (COS) Remnants of the Dad's Point that are not in the DWSC occupied by the City of Stockton (COS)

No formal action has been taken by the board of the agency relative to acquiring the land from the City of Stockton

- ▶ (SL) The original bed of the San Joaquin River subject to the public trust and under the control of the State Lands Commission. (SLC)

The Board and the State Lands have agreed to lease the sovereign lands of the State. The lease states (EX 85) Draft General Lease that *"Prior to the start of construction, lessee shall have all permits and authorizations from all federal, state and local agencies having jurisdiction over the project"* The lease expires in 2044 and appears to overlap the ship turning basin.
